UPDATE ON THE ROYAL COMMISSION INTO ADF SUICIDES

8 September 2023

Address by Commissioner Nick Kaldas APM (Chair)

The Chair of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide says he fears the Defence hierarchy is waiting for the inquiry to end so they can go back to business as usual.

The Royal Commission has today concluded its 11th public hearing in Melbourne, where it's heard further evidence about cultural and systemic issues within the Australian Defence Force and Departments of Defence and Veterans' Affairs.

In his closing statement, Commissioner Nick Kaldas warned the problems will never be fixed if leadership does not accept, they exist.

"We still have not identified any strong evidence to suggest that Defence is prioritising the mental health and wellbeing of its people in a sustainable way," Commissioner Kaldas said.

"Nor does it seem to be responding adequately to the pressing issue of suicide and suicidality in its ranks with any sense of urgency."
"We Commissioners fear the Defence hierarchy is simply waiting for this inquiry to end so that it can go back to business as usual. We hope that's not the case," he told the hearing.

The two-week hearing focused on the experience of ADF personnel transitioning to civilian life; cultural problems within Defence and how the hierarchy manages complaints relating to unacceptable behaviour; the lack of support from Defence and DVA for veterans and their families; and the military justice system in the ADF and how that is monitored.

The Royal Commission heard evidence from a former medical advisor within DVA who painted a bleak picture of the Department – highlighting poor leadership, a culture of blame and lack of interest in innovation.

"Regardless of the good work the DVA has been doing recently to clear the backlog of claims – its outdated systems and processes, as well as its adversarial approach to those it is supposed to be supporting, seem to be designed to limit access to entitlements. This must change," Mr Kaldas said.

The Royal Commission will next sit in Sydney from Monday 20 November 2023. Its final report is due to be delivered by no later than 17 June next year.

# Address by Commissioner Nick Kaldas APM (Chair) National Press Club, Canberra

I want to start today by. Taking you back to Australia's very first Royal Commission. The S.S. Drayton Grange was a British merchant vessel charted to transport 1,500 Australians returning home from the Boer War in South Africa in July 1902. Considerable overcrowding and unsanitary conditions, compounded by a lack of adequate medical supplies and poor weather, led to outbreaks of measles and influenza, as well as lice infestation.

By the time the troopship had docked in Melbourne at the end of its month-long voyage, five soldiers were dead – and another 12 died in the weeks that followed.

Public outrage led to the Royal Commissions Act being enacted in August 1902 – and within days Australia's first Royal Commission into the Drayton Grange was underway.

It ultimately found the Officer Commanding Troops wanted to do the best in a trying position.

But 'the best' seemed to be accepting things as they were, rather than making strenuous efforts to improve them – to endure rather than to overcome.

One might draw parallels between this dark chapter in our military history, and the current tragedy at the core of *this* Royal Commission.

The Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide was established in 2021 after then-Prime Minister Morrison bowed to political pressure from cross-party MPs and Senators.

That followed a hard-fought and sustained campaign by the brave families of Australian veterans who had taken their own lives, as well as former ADF members who were traumatised in various ways.

The numbers are <u>heartbreaking</u>.

There were at least 1,600 deaths by suicide between 1997 and 2020 of veterans who served on or after 1 January 1985.

That's more than 20-times the number killed in active duty over roughly the same period.

There is also mention in this statement that there are some 30,000 claims still to be processed, down from around 43,000 a year ago.

15 September 2023

Address by Commissioners Nick Kaldas APM (Chair), Dr. Peggy Brown AO and James Douglas KC

The Royal Commission's focus on hearing from people with lived experience of suicide or suicidality in the military will be greatly supported by the introduction of a new bill to Federal Parliament on 7 September 2023.

The Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide received more than 1000 eligible applications for private sessions prior to the closing date on 28 April 2023. Commissioners have already conducted 535 sessions with people who have lived experience of suicide and suicidality in the Australian Defence Force.

There are some 400 sessions still to be undertaken between now and June 2024, when the Royal Commission's final report is due to be handed to Government.

Current laws mean only a Royal Commissioner can conduct a confidential one-on-one meeting with a person with lived experience.

"We Commissioners are undertaking as many sessions as possible, both in person and virtually; however, to get through the large number of outstanding private sessions in the time we have left, we must appoint an Assistant Commissioner to help us," Commissioner Kaldas said.

The new legislation will allow for the appointment of an Assistant Commissioner with the appropriate skills, experience and gravitas required to undertake private sessions alongside the three existing Commissioners over the next nine months.

"We know how important these sessions are to veterans and their families, and the catharsis and validation they bring to so many people impacted by suicide and suicidality.

We want to continue to give them the time and attention they deserve, and the addition of an Assistant Commissioner will ensure that."

One can assume that this new position of Assistant Commissioner came about after the Commissioners wrote to the Prime Minister on the 11 May 2023 requesting an extension of time to complete the inquiry, especially with the one on one private sessions, still to be completed as only about 500 of these sessions had been undertaken with many more to go.

On the 1 August 2023 the commission was informed that no extension had not been granted. However, this refusal was followed with a changing of the Act so that an Assistant Commissioner could be appointed.

One would assume that this move was an effort by the government following their refusal to extend to complete in full and outcome of the Royal Commission.

We now have three Pension Officers/Advocates who are currently processing a significant number of claims for veterans and defence personnel. We are more than happy to field enquiries from any veteran or defence member. You don't have to be a member of the RSL to receive this service and it is free of charge.

DVA is still processing significant claim numbers and delays are still impacting claims in a timely manner, but we have been assured that the processing times are decreasing.

Non-liability health care is still available to Veterans under VEA and MRCA for Mental Health and Cancer plus some other conditions.

# Australian company wins government grant to secure global F-35 work

25 July 2023

A Melbourne company will use a \$1.5 million Australian Government grant to buy a next generation machining centre to secure more work on the global F-35 Program.

A key supplier to the aerospace and defence industries, Lovitt Technologies will also use the grant to train staff and upgrade equipment and software.

A machining centre is an advanced, fast, computer-controlled machine that can perform multiple operations like milling, boring and drilling.

Lovitt Technologies is the first recipient of Defence's Joint Strike Fighter Industry Support Program - Production and Modernisation Grant, which provides local companies up to 50 per cent of the money they need to develop new or improved capabilities to secure work from the lucrative program.

More than 70 Australian companies have already benefitted from over \$3.7 billion in global F-35 production and sustainment contracts.

Australia plans to have 72 fifth-generation, F-35A Lightning II aircraft combining air-to-air, strike and ground attack capabilities.

Head of Aerospace Systems Divisions, Air Vice-Marshal Graham Edwards AM CSC, said Defence wanted more skilled Australian workers to benefit from long-term jobs from the F-35 Program and strengthen Australia's defence industry.

The grant scheme will introduce a new capability to Australia to manufacture larger and more complex components for the F-35 Program, which will also benefit other Defence programs.

"Australian industry is poised to increase its contribution to the global F-35 Program, which has more than 930 aircraft with an expected global fleet of over 3000," Air Vice-Marshal Edwards said.

# **Chaplain's Corner**

The Significance of Silence

It was on November 11<sup>th</sup>, 1918, that the guns fell silent on the Western Front bringing an end to WW1 after 4 years of continuous warfare. 330 000 people served in WW1, 60,,000 never made it home.

Remembrance Day Services are a tradition where we remember all who have served in the Australian Defence Force, in World War I and in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations since.

This year RSL Australia are calling on all Australians to make it to a Remembrance Day Service to honour those who served. If you can't make it to a service, it's easy to set a reminder on your calendar, switch your phone to 'do not disturb' and pause for one minute to remember. It's a simple action that will mean so much.

Pausing for 1-2 minutes silence is a sign of respect and a time for reflection. Henry George Honey a Melbourne journalist and World War I veteran, was living in London in 1919. Honey wrote a letter that was published in the London Evening News. He suggested that the commemoration on Armistice Day (now Remembrance Day) should be a brief but solemn ceremony, including a pause of silence for 5 minutes. That period would honour the service and sacrifice of those who had died during World War I. Henry said:


'Five little minutes only. Five silent minutes of national remembrance. A very sacred intercession. Communion with the Glorious Dead who won us peace, and from the communion new strength, hope and faith in the morrow.'

Today we normally do not have a full 5 minutes of silence though, the silence in our Remembrance Service is sacred. As we reflect and our hearts join with those who paid the supreme sacrifice and with them, we join in strength, hope and faith in the tomorrow. For people who are Christian our hearts commune with God too.

# **UH-60M Blackhawk**

Two new Black Hawks have arrived in Australia, which will eventually form part of a 40-strong helicopter fleet to replace the army's troubled Taipans that remain grounded following last month's crash in Queensland.

# **Key points:**

- Two of the US-made UH-60M Black Hawk helicopters have been delivered to Holsworthy army barracks in Sydney.
  - The Black Hawks are among 40 ordered by Defence to replace the troubled MRH-90 Taipan

Investigations into last month's deadly Taipan crash are continuing

The ABC has confirmed the pair of American-made helicopters was transported into Sydney's RAAF Base Richmond last Sunday, two days after the MRH-90 tragedy occurred.

Flight data reveals the two new UH-60M aircraft have now been delivered to the Holsworthy army barracks where the 6th Aviation Regiment is based, supporting members of 2nd Commando Regiment. ~~~Cont Page 15/..

"The first two of 40 UH-60M Black Hawk helicopters for the Australian Army arrived at RAAF Base Richmond Sunday 30 July via US Air Force C-17, as scheduled," a spokesperson for Defence Minister Richard Marles said.

In January, Defence announced it would acquire 40 of the Sikorsky manufactured Black Hawks which will replace the Taipan fleet from next year, although the government is being urged to accelerate the transition.

# Defence joins international effort to enforce sanctions on North Korea

Defence has conducted air surveillance of illegal activity in North Korea as part of an international effort to eliminate nuclear weapons in the country.

As part of Operation Argos, Defence deployed two Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) P-8A Poseidon maritime patrol aircraft to enforce United Nations Security Council (UNSC) sanctions on the rogue nuclear state.

Operating from Kadena Air Base in Japan, the P-8A Poseidon aircraft conducted airborne surveillance to monitor and deter illegal ship-to-ship transfers of sanctioned goods in the region.

Since 2018, Australia has deployed RAAF maritime patrol aircraft on 12 occasions and Royal Australian Navy vessels nine times to support the UNSC sanctions.

"Operation Argos reinforces Australia's commitment to nuclear non-proliferation and directly contributes to maintaining the rulesbased order in the Indo-Pacific region alongside our partner nations.

"This operation is Australia's contribution to a multinational effort, alongside Canada, France, Germany, Japan, New Zealand, Republic of Korea, the United Kingdom and the United States, all of which conduct operations in support of UN Security Council resolutions."

# TRIBUNAL DEFINES 'WAR AND PEACE' FOR AUSTRALIAN DEFENCE FORCE, OPENS BENEFITS FOR VETERANS

Defence has lost a 30 year battle to declare ADF deployments to Malaysia during a terrorist insurgency as a routine training exercise in an administrative "oversight" that has robbed 9000 veterans of entitlements.

The Defence Honours and Awards Appeal Tribunal (DHAAT) landmark ruling now defines "war" and "peace" and a category in between, that will have ramifications for all future deployments for the Australian Defence Force. (ADF)

The Tribunal was tasked by the Government in 2022' to look into the deployment of the Army's Rifle Company Butterworth between 1970 and 1980 during a Malay emergency brought on by the communist and terrorist insurgency.

Defence had consistently since that time declared it a training exercise before a trove of declassified military and intelligence documents clearly showed it was not, with maps and other memos warning of likely directions of attack on RAAF assets.

But ironically like most wars, there was no clear winner with the exhaustive 18 month Tribunal inquiry ruling it neither war nor peace, but in between in a category called "non warlike". The ruling means 9000 mostly army veterans who had been deployed to Malaysia to protect the RAAF crews stationed in Butterworth in those years, will now be entitled to more benefits under the Veterans Entitlement Act.

The extent of those entitlements and whether they will be retrospective and to be passed onto widows of those men since passed is not clear.

The Tribunal found in September 2007 the then Veterans Affairs Minister Bruce Bilson sought to clarify the deployment and declare it "non warlike service" but the instrument was not registered by Defence on the Federal Register of Legislation and thus never came into force. Because of this oversight, RCB personnel had only been entitles to baseline entitlements as veterans. The Tribunal has made 10 recommendations that, if accepted by the federal government, be immediately changed. ~~~~~~Cont....Page 21/

~~~Cont.....from Page 22~~Retired Lieutenant Colonel Graeme Mickelberg who was instrumental in pursuing justice for himself and his colleagues said the overall findings were "win-lose", in that many veterans believed it was war-like.

"It is not clear what this means for the veterans and importantly the widows of those who have passed since the 2007 decision." he said.

"What is damning here, and the tribunal chair picked up on this day, it was a hazardous deployment and now it is non-warlike in the context of the Veterans Entitlement Act and therefore benefits should flow. My question is if today's Veteran Affairs Minister Matt Keogh accepts these recommendations what does that mean for those disadvantaged retrospectively? Will widows whose husbands should have been eligible for benefits at that time now be awarded, for example, a disability pension?" He said this highlighted how successive governments and Defence has not paid due regard to veterans and their families.

In his 72-page July 2022 submission to the Tribunal, ADF Chief Angus Campbell said, Defence and successive Australian Governments had consistently and appropriately classified the mission as peacetime service and that should not change.

The Tribunal was critical of that view which it called "factually incorrect" given the overwhelming evidence otherwise, notably a 1993 Cabinet definition of war and the Billson ruling which has now been deemed as still legally valid despite Defence administratively losing it since 2007.

"It seemed to the Tribunal that, colloquially speaking, Defence had been 'making it up as it goes', the Tribunal concluded noting it was Defence's statutory duty to see the Billson changes through and it did not do that.

The Invictus Games is an international sporting event for wounded, injured and ill serving and former serving military personnel. The games use the power of sport to support recovery, rehabilitation and generate wider understanding and respect for those who serve their country.

Our veterans have sacrificed a lot for our country, but these games mean that one thing they don't have to sacrifice is their love of sport.

This year, the games were held in Düsseldorf from 9 to 16 September. Australia's competitors participated in athletics, indoor rowing, powerlifting, road cycling, sitting volleyball, table tennis, swimming, wheelchair basketball and wheelchair rugby.

The Invictus Games are a great way to support our Veterans, but I know that there are still plenty who are doing it tough. The increasing cost of living doesn't help either. That is why I was glad to hear the Minister for Social Services, The Hon Amanda Rishworth MP, announced that there will be a boost to the support payments of Veterans.

Single veterans on a service pension should now be receiving an additional \$32.70, bringing their service pension to \$1096.70 a fortnight, while veterans on the Disability Compensation Payment (Special Rate), known as the Totally and Permanently Incapacitated Payment will receive an additional \$53.00 a fortnight, increasing their payment to \$1729.20.

Not only will the indexation of these payments help veteran families with the cost of living, certain fortnightly education allowances will also increase, ensuring veteran families are better supported.

I hope the additional allowance will go at least some way to easing the financial pressures which are being felt by so many.

I hope this latest newsletter finds you well.

It's been, at times, a torrid first six months of the 58th NSW Parliament. One of my roles as the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly is to oversee question time and to maintain order in the House. I can tell you it has, on occasions, been quite a challenge.

One of my aspirations over the next three and a half years is to improve the standard of behaviour in the Chamber (which is sometimes referred to as "the bear pit"). Of course, we are never going to make the House a "teddy bear pit" but as members of Parliament we should be able to maintain good robust debate whilst still being respectful and professional. I am up for the challenge though, and I will continue to do my best to keep the members in order and on point!

Locally, I had the opportunity to give NSW Premier Chris Minns a tour of Lake Macquarie in early September. While visiting Lake Macquarie the Premier confirmed an additional \$6 million in funding to address congestion issues around the Speers Point roundabout.

Transport for NSW are now working on plans to fix congestion and increase safety around TC Frith Avenue and The Esplanade. These plans will be provided to the community for feedback and consultation when they are finalised, I hope before the end of this year!

While I had the ear of the Premier, I also took the opportunity to discuss the need to improve infrastructure and services to meet the growing population of Lake Macquarie including health services and road upgrades, particularly around the Southern Lakes area.

In other news, in August I gave notice of a Bill I have been working on to increase the effectiveness of organ donation transplants in NSW and I am continuing to have discussions with the Government on a range of issues including mining and energy transition and the new Lake Macquarie Sport and Recreation Centre.

# KOOKIES MORSELS

# HOISIN CHICKEN STIR-FRY

500g boneless chicken breasts 2tbsp vegetable oil

3 garlic cloves, roughly chopped 1 onion, sliced into wedges

2 capsicum deseeded, cut into bite sized pieces

3 spring onions (shallots), cut into batons on an angle.

### **MARINADE**

3 tbsp soy sauce ½ tsp dark soy sauce

1 tbsp Chinese Shaoxing wine ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda

3 tsp cornflour or arrowroot

### HOISIN STIR FRY SAUCE

3 tbsp hoisin sauce 3 tbsp Chinese Shaoxing wine

1 tbsp soy sauce ½ tsp dark soy sauce

2 tsp white vinegar 2 tsp sugar

1 and a ½ tsp ground black pepper.

Slice the chicken across the breasts (against the grain) on the diagonal to form wide strips about 3-4mm thick. Place in a bowl. Whisk together the marinade and pour over the chicken and mix well with your hands to make sure that each slice gets a good cover. Set aside for 10 minutes.

To make the hoisin stir-fry sauce, mix the ingredients in a bowl to combine and set aside.

When ready, heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan or wok over high heat. Add the onion and stir fry for about 30 seconds. Push the onion to the sides of the pan and add the chicken and the marinade into the centre. Spread the chicken out as much as possible and leave for about for 3-4 minutes, or until a crust begins to form. Then combine with the other ingredients in the wok.

Toss through the garlic. Then add the capsicum. Stir fry for another 30 seconds (leaving the capsicum crunchy) or until everything is well coated, the sauce has thickened slightly, and the chicken has finished cooking. Toss through the spring onions and serve over rice or as is, your choice.

Serves: 2 to 3 plus

# SIMPLE CURRIED SAUSAGES

6 thick/thin sausages your choice as to the sausage and flavour

1 tbsp vegetable oil.

1 large brown onion, halved, sliced thin.

1 carrot peeled and thinly sliced 1 tbsp Keens curry powder

1 cup frozen peas 350ml Beef stock

1 tbsp cornflour or arrowroot 2 tbsp water

Heat the oil in a large frypan over medium to high heat, add the sausages and fry until browned all over, turning often to cook through then set aside, allow to cool slightly and then cut on an angle about 4cm slices, set aside. In the same pan add the onion and carrot and cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, do not burn, cook until the onion is translucent. Then add the curry powder, beef stock and return the sausages to the pan. Bring to the boil then reduce to a simmer,

Mix the cornstarch or arrowroot with the 2 tbsp of cold water in a small cup, pour into the pan with the curried sausages and gently mix through. Add the peas and continue cooking for about another 5 minutes until the sauce thickens.

Season with salt and pepper. Serve over mashed potato, cooked rice, pasta or noodles. Serves 2-3

### **NEW COMBAT VEHICLE**

Minister for Defence Industry Pat Conroy has **confirmed at a press conference in Canberra** in late July 2023 that Hanwha Defence Australia has secured the contract to build 129 Redback infantry fighting vehicles for the Commonwealth under Land 400 Phase 3.



The decision comes nearly five years since Defence issued its Land 400 Phase 3 (Mounted Combat Capability) Request for Tender.

It also comes just four months after the number of Infantry Fighting Vehicles (IFVs) expected by Army to replace its long-obsolete M113AS4 armoured personnel carriers was slashed from 450 to 129 in April's Defence Strategic Review (DSR).

With this number inclusive of training, repair and attrition stock, the IFVs will equip a single mechanised battalion, in particular for littoral manoeuvre, as part of a single armoured combined-arms brigade "able to meet the most demanding land challenges in our region".

South Korea's Hanwha beat out competition from Germany's Rheinmetall to secure the contract, which is the first time a multi-billion dollar Australian defence contract has been awarded to an Asian nation.

# HMAS Anzac conducts Exercise Lumbas 2023 in the Philippines

28 JULY 2023

Philippine Navy bilateral Exercise Lumbas has drawn to a close in Subic Bay with Anzac Class frigate HMAS *Anzac* taking part during a regional presence deployment.

The crews of Philippine Navy ship BRP *Conrado*Yap and Anzac joined for the five-day exercise, which was a valuable opportunity to train together.

Royal Australian Navy (RAN) Commanding Officer
HMAS Anzac, Commander Barton Harrington said Lumbas aimed
to build skills through expert exchanges, enhance cooperation and
deepen cultural and people-to-people ties.

"We joined our Philippine Navy counterparts both ashore for the opening and closing ceremonies and at sea, off their coast to conduct a series of training activities in warfare, maritime security and seamanship," he said.

"Now in its 23rd iteration, Lumbas is one of the RAN's longestrunning recurring engagements in the region. It is an important and longstanding activity in our bilateral engagement with the Philippines.

"Australia is committed to working closely with the Philippines to support a region that is stable, secure and prosperous and where the rule of law prevails.

"I'm proud of the hard work put in by everyone aboard *Anzac* and it was great to see the engagement between all participants of Lumbas," Commander Harrington said.

Australia and the Philippines have agreed to formally elevate the bilateral relationship to a strategic partnership, with Defence and maritime cooperation as core pillars.

Anzac commenced the regional presence deployment in April demonstrating Australia's commitment to and engagement with the Indo-Pacific region



15 August 2023

United States Army units were invited to join Australia's 3rd Brigade on its annual culminating live-fire activity at Townsville Field Training Area this month.

Shortly after Exercise Talisman Sabre, units from the 3rd Brigade conducted Exercise Brolga Sprint with the United States 25th Infantry and 1st Armoured Divisions, during which infantry, armour, artillery and combat engineers worked together to achieve the mission.

Platforms involved in the exercise included ARH Tiger, M1A1 Abrams, M777 howitzers, 81-millimetre mortars, S AH-64 Apaches, M1A2 Abrams, UH-60 Black Hawks and CH-47 Chinooks.

Commanding Officer 4th Regiment, Royal Australian Artillery, Lieutenant Colonel David Silverstone, said this year's exercise was adjusted to test the two allies' ability to integrate.

"We saw United States tanks integrated within an Australian tank squadron, our Tigers flying alongside the United States Apaches, and Australian and United States firing guns side by side," Lieutenant Colonel Silverstone said. "We're learning about what we do differently, but most importantly we're discovering the similarities between our nations."

A major component of the exercise involved air mobility operations and air assault serials. ~~~~~Cont Page 36/..


