



Our Pension Officers have been very busy of late with some 43 clients with a number of varying cases, totalling around 120 which are at present are at various stages with the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

They also have 2 VRB (Veteran Review Board) appeals underway.

They have had in the past month 6 successful cases.

When the RMA meet they discuss many issue as far as making amendments to the Statement of Principals (SoPs) etc., all the time; so if you think you have a genuine claim for Service in the ADF you can check for any new decisions made by the RMA on their website under "What's New".





USS Mississippi visits Western Australia

Australia welcomes the USS Mississippi and its crew to Fleet Base West, HMAS Stirling. The Virginia Class submarine is in Australia for a routine visit to provide respite for the crew. The visit reflects the ongoing strength of Australia's alliance with the United States and builds on previous visits of nuclear-powered submarines from our AUKUS partners. Since 1960, Australia has hosted over 285 visits by UK and US nuclear-powered vessels with over 1840 total days in port. The USS Mississippi is the second US nuclear-powered vessel to visit Australia in 2022, following a visit by the USS Springfield in April.

A GOOD START BUT THERE IS MORE TO DO

November of last year was the first opportunity that I had as Member for Hunter to attend Remembrance Day services right across the electorate. These services were a credit to the hard work put in by the many RSL personnel right across the Hunter.

I also had the honour of rising in the House of Representatives to recognise the contribution that service men and women from the Hunter have made to the major conflicts which have shaped our nation.

In this speech I shared the story of a local Victoria Cross recipient of the First World War, Captain Clarence Smith Jeffries.

Captain Jeffries was recognised for his 'most conspicuous bravery'. When in battle, his company was held up by machine gun fire from enemy bunkers. Captain Jeffries organised a party and rushed one bunker, capturing four machine guns and 35 prisoners before leading his company forward under extremely heavy enemy artillery barrage and machine gun fire to

the objective. He went on to organise another successful attack on a machine gun bunker, capturing two machine guns and 30 more prisoners.

Captain Jeffries went on to be killed during this attack, but it was said that it was entirely due to his bravery and initiative that the centre of the attack was not held up for a lengthy period. He was described as a gallant officer whose example had the utmost of inspiring influences on many. Captain Jefferies, thank you for your service. Your leadership and your courage are lessons for all of us to follow.

The story of Captain Jeffries is an inspiring one and makes me feel a great sense of pride in my country and in my electorate, knowing that like all parts of Australia the Hunter played its part.

This is why it is so important to look after our veterans, and in our first 6 months as a Labor Government, we have made Veterans Affairs an important area of focus. The issue of Veteran suicide is something that touches far too many lives. And for too long, the Department of Veterans Affairs missed the mark and made life harder for people to whom our nation owes a great debt of gratitude. It is a great tragedy that the Australian Government, successive Australian Governments, have failed those who have served our nation. But our government is doing our best to make things right. We want to ensure that veterans have the dignity and respect shown to them that they deserve.

Our government is taking the recommendations made by the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide seriously, and we are implementing all of the 13 changes suggested – with some changes already underway. I'm proud to be a part of a Government that takes these issues seriously and puts looking after our veterans at the top of our list of priorities.

It has been an amazing past 6 months and I look forward to the year ahead.

PROGRESS REPORT INTO DEFENCE AND VETERANS' SUICIDES

The Hearings from the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide, the RSL NSW Royal Commission Office has prepared a summary of the Wagga Wagga Hearing Block, including the key themes examined so far and the actions of the League in response. RSL NSW will continue to provide these summaries periodically. The next Hearing Block will begin in Perth on 15 May 2023 and will be livestreamed on the Royal Commission website.

The Royal Commission has so far received close to 3000 submissions and conducted 258 private sessions across the country. The RSL has had representatives present at all hearings and is listening to and acting on the evidence being presented.

During the four days of the Wagga Wagga hearing block, the Commissioners heard testimony on a broad range of relevant issues, including:

- The importance of ADF training facilities for instilling the desired culture and ethics of the ADF into recruits and trainees
 - ADF recruiting practices, including recruitment standards and targets, retention, training, and separation
 - Ongoing issues relating to data and reporting, including the inability of the ADF Chain of Command to receive information required to effect reform
 - Issues with the ADF medical system
 - The importance of providing local services for local veterans
 During the hearing block, the Royal Commission heard from
 Commanding Officer representing various ADF training facilities.
 They also heard from Dr Robert Worswick, a medical doctor and former serving member on the impact of recruiting standards on health and wellbeing.

The Wagga Wagga Hearings heard impactful lived experience testimony. This included former Recruit James Geercke, whose life was irreversibly impacted by a back injury suffered during training and subsequent medical treatment, and Kylie Reynolds, who outlined the effects of sexual assault, bullying and injuries from her time in the Army.

The Royal Commission will continue throughout 2023, with the first Public Hearing Block to be held in May in Perth, before visiting Adelaide and Melbourne in the second half of the year. The Commissioners will focus on conducting roundtables, private sessions, Stakeholder Reference Groups, and releasing several Special Reports before the Perth block.

The Royal Commission will accept submissions until Friday, 13 October 2023. The Royal Commissioners continually emphasise the importance of submissions to inform their work. A final report, and the Royal Commissioners' recommendations, are due to Parliament no later than 17 June 2024.

AUSTRALIA DIGGERS IDENTIFIED 105 YEARS AFTER THEIR FALL

An extraordinary story caught my eye last month and it reminded me how technology is helping to find and honour our Diggers who died in conflict overseas.

In short, three Australian soldiers who fought in WWI were formally identified more than 105 years after they were killed on the Western Front.

The remains of the three soldiers were found in 2006 and 2010 but historical, anthropological, archaeological and DNA analysis by the Australian Army has linked them to their descendants all these years later. Quite extraordinary.

Two of the soldiers - Private Walter Allen Grace and Private Edwin Charles Gray - had died near Fromelles in northern France while the third - Private Thomas Allen Gibbens - had died in Belgium.

All three had been buried in wartime cemeteries and were never identified until now by teams of volunteers dedicated to such tasks. Each will have their graves formally rededicated next year.

I cannot imagine the peace and comfort that this brings to the descendants of those Diggers, but I know I feel immensely proud that we are making these efforts to locate and identify our fallen heroes. Their sacrifice will never be forgotten.

It was lovely to be able to attend a Remembrance Day service this year after many years of disruptions due to the pandemic.

I attended the Southlakes RSL sub-branch service at Dora Creek this year and there was a good crowd in attendance, like there was at other services.

It's now 104 years since the guns fell silent on the Western Front, but we use Remembrance Day to honour the 103,000 Australians who have lost their lives in all conflicts, as well as those who have served our country in war, conflict and peacekeeping roles.

We will always remember them.

On a lighter note, if you're ever interested in coming down for a free tour of Parliament House, let me know.

Throughout the year, I host local groups who come down for a free tour of the Parliament with Madeleine, one of my staffers. Each tour travels through the halls of the historic building and we usually stop for lunch before getting a seat in the chamber for Question Time.

I can't accommodate large groups, but if you're part of a small group which is interested, give my office a call on 4959-3200 and we'll try to fit you in. Numbers and days are limited and the year books out quickly, so get on to it early if you can.

I'm hoping you're now focused on spending time with your loved ones and friends over Christmas.

PORK MEDALLIONS WITH CRUNCHY PEANUT BUTTER AND COCONUT CREAM

4 pork loin steaks ½ cup of crunchy peanut butter

2 tbsp sweet chilli sauce 2 tsp fish sauce

1/4 cup water Fresh coriander to serve

Cook pork on oiled heated grill plate or BBQ to your liking.

While cooking, combine peanut butter, sweet sauce, fish sauce and water.in a small saucepan. When ready (just before serving the pork) cook the sauce, stirring for about 3 minutes or until it slightly thickens.

Serve pork drizzled with sauce and sprinkled with coriander

ACCOMPANY WITH POTATO AND CABBAGE MASH

500g white potatoes peeled and quartered

2 cups of shredded cabbage 50g butter

4 eschalots sliced white part thin ~ green part about 5mm

Splash of Cream or Milk Pinch of Ground Nutmeg.

Cook potatoes in salted water until tender. Once cooked reserve ¼ cup of cooking water. Leave potatoes in water until ready

In a small frypan or saucepan sauté the cabbage for 2 minutes in half the butter. Add the ¼ cup of water, cover and cook for about 2 minutes.

Then drain the water from the potatoes, add the remaining butter, nutmeg, cabbage and eschalots and mash. Whilst doing so, add the splash of cream or milk for added creaminess. Season with salt and pepper if needed.

PRAWN CURRY

1 tbsp oil ½ tsp ground ginger

½ tsp cinnamon ½ tsp turmeric

3-4 tsp mild curry powder 1 cup chicken stock

Granny Smith apple, peeled and chopped medium

1 cup canned coconut milk 1 tsp sugar

2 tbsp Arrowroot or Cornflour, blended with a little water

500g medium raw prawns, peeled ~ salt to taste

Place oil, ginger, cinnamon, turmeric and curry powder in a frypan; stir to combine. Cook on high for about 2 minutes, until fragrant. Add apple, stir with spices to coat and cook on medium for 3 to 4 minutes, stirring 2 to 3 times. Do not cover dish. Stir in blended arrowroot or cornflour and cook for 2 to 3 minutes until it thickens. Add prawns and salt, stir well, and cook for further 2 minutes or until prawns are opaque

Serve with your choice of rice.

Garnish with either parsley or coriander sprigs.

A tomato and onion ring salad with your favourite dressing makes for a nice accompaniment.


